• Camp Conestoga offers Scouts a great environment to work on merit badges that you need to achieve the Eagle Rank. With a crystalclear swimming pool, a 6-acre lake, a handicraft building, ecology and conservation area, a STEAMcraft area, a scoutcraft area and, Rifle and Shotgun ranges, you will have the opportunity to earn merit badges that are not easily earned at home.

• The badges listed below are offered weekly at Camp Conestoga. Most badges can be completed during your stay, but some require the completion of pre-requisite requirements. These pre-requisites must be completed before you come to camp for you to earn the merit badge while at camp. Some merit badges also require an additional cost for program supplies. All merit badge pre-requisites and costs will be listed in the Camp Leader's Guide. All Scoutmasters will be able to download a copy of the Leader's Guide from our Council Website, (wfbsa.org). Additional merit badges may be offered depending on the abilities of the camp staff and the participation of camp leaders. You will be notified of all additional merit badges being offered at camp during the Sunday evening Leader's Meeting.

Pathfinder Program

Scouts participating in the Pathfinder Program will have a unique opportunity to immerse themselves in a variety of foundational scout skills, spanning from Scout Rank all the way to First Class. This program is designed to help scouts build confidence and proficiency in essential skills, such as knot tying, basic navigation, first aid, outdoor survival techniques, and more. In addition to these technical skills, scouts will also have the chance to develop leadership abilities, teamwork, and problem-solving skills, all while navigating camp and participating in real-world scenarios.

The Pathfinder Program follows a morning-only schedule, which allows scouts the flexibility to choose from a wide range of merit badges in the afternoon based on their interests. This structured time encourages scouts to take responsibility for their own learning, pursue personal goals, and further enhance their scouting knowledge. In the mornings, scouts will be divided into 3-4 patrols, fostering a collaborative environment where they will work closely together. As a team, they will engage in hands-on learning, solve challenges, and embrace the patrol method-an essential component of scouting that promotes leadership, communication, and camaraderie. By the end of the program, scouts will have not only honed their individual skills but also deepened their connection to the scouting community.



Project C.O.P.E.



Project COPE is a specialty program designed for Scouts aged 14 and up and who have achieved the First-Class rank. The COPE program helps Scouts build confidence and a positive attitude towards life's challenges through themed activities and initiative games. Scouts are put to the test as they work together in teams to complete the various elements in Camp Conestoga's low elements COPE course. All Scouts in the COPE program will have the opportunity to conquer Camp Conestoga's 50 ft. climbing and rappelling tower and experience the 550-foot zip-line!



Due to the time intensive nature of the program, all Scouts participating in this program will have limited Merit Badge choices. The COPE program also requires fair weather since the tower and low-elements course cannot be safely completed in the rain.

Traditionally, parents bring picnic type foods or desserts for the troop, parents, and guests to eat in the campsite. However, dinner will be available in the dining hall for a fee of \$7.00 per parents / visitor, (Campers are Free). All Scoutmasters must inform us of any family having dinner in the camp's dining hall and the number of people attending. The dinner fee may be paid at the door.

Parents / visitors bringing items to camp may be unable to park in or close to the campsite. All parents / visitors should be prepared to walk from the designated parking lots and make sure the items being brought to camp are easily transported.



Visitor Night- Open



During the summer, visitors will be able to use the Zip Line on Family Night. The participant requirements are as follows:

- \checkmark All participants must be at least 14 years old.
- ✓ All participants must have a signed and completed waiver (obtainable from www.wfbsa.org). If under 18, the waiver MUST be signed by participant's parent or guardian.
- ✓ All participants must purchase a ticket at the COPE Tower (\$5.00). Arrangements to participate in this activity can be made through an adult leader that is staying at camp.
- ✓ The Wednesday Night Zip Line is open from 5:30pm to 6:55pm. Please be prompt because all activities will cease at 7pm for Evening Colors and the OA Calling Out Ceremony.

Reservation Fee – ALL SCOUTS

\$50.00 PER SCOUT - Due in the Council Service Center by MARCH 8th, 2025.

The troop will receive the discounted fee to be paid in full by MAY 3rd, 2025, for only the number of Scouts that the Troop has paid \$50 for by this date. Exception will be AOL/Webelo Scouts moving to the troop; they will receive the discounted price until MAY 3rd, 2025, or date arranged by Camp Director as needed. This fee is necessary to hold the troop campsite and is credited toward the remaining balance. The fee is **NON-REFUNDABLE but is transferable to a NEW Scout added to the roster**, (see the refund policy for more information about transferability).

Early Bird Camp Fees - \$420.00 PER SCOUT, PER WEEK, IF PAID IN FULL BY MAY 2nd, 2025.

Regular Camp Fees - \$440.00 PER SCOUT, PER WEEK, IF PAID IN FULL AFTER MAY 2nd, 2025.

Troop Fee: \$25.00 per troop, this fee reserves the campsite and may be rolled over from year-to-year attendance.

Second Week of Camp Fee: \$385. 00 PER SCOUT, PER WEEK OF CAMP.

Camp Fees – Units Cooking in their Campsite \$75.00 price reduction per Scout by prior arrangements. The fee is: \$345.00 PER SCOUT.

Leader Fees: The First 2 leaders for every unit are free. Beyond the initial 2 leaders, a ratio of 1 leader to every 8 scouts will allow an additional leader to attend camp at no charge. Units bringing more than 2 leaders that do not meet the 1 to 8 ratio will be charged \$220.00 per additional leader, (Cooking in site: \$150.00 per additional leader).

- 01-16 Scouts = 2 Free Leaders Beyond 32 Scouts the ratio stays the same.
- 17 24 Scouts = 3 Free Leaders
- 25 32 Scouts = 4 Free Leaders, One more free adult at 33, 41, 49, 57, 65, and etc.

Family Discount: Fee for second (and subsequent) Scouts attending Camp Conestoga there will be a \$35 per Scout discount. The fee is \$385. Families with Scouts attending both Conestoga and Buck Run, the Cub Scout receives the 10% discount on the second (and subsequent) Scout camp fees.

REMINDER: A COMPLETED TROOP ROSTER WITH ALL YOUTH AND ADULT LEADERS ATTENDING IS REQUIRED WHEN MAKING DEPOSITS ON MARCH 7th, 2025 / MAKING FINAL PAYMENTS ON MAY 2nd, 2025 / AND WHEN YOUR TROOP CHECKS IN AT CAMP.

Housing

All soouts and leaders will be staying in BSA issued wide-wall canvas tents on wooden platforms. (2 Campers per Tent) There is a pavilion, picnic tables, fire circle and bulletin board located at each campsite. Running water and bathhouses are located near each campsite. Your campsite will be your home while you are at camp. You are expected to keep it clean.

Camp Conestoga Contact Information The camp telephone is available for business and emergency use only. All parents wishing to contact a camper should call 814-445-2018. A message will be delivered to the scout. Camp telephone is available for scouts/leaders to use in emergencies.

There is a camp mailbox that is checked each day and mail will be delivered to troop mailbox in camp office. All campers can also send mail as well. Parents should send stamps and envelopes for their scouts to mail letters home. Parents sending mail should do so as early as one week prior to ensure it arrives on time for their week

Health Lodge

Our modern, state of the art Health Lodge is staffed by qualified, fully licensed personnel 24 hours a day to provide Immediate or Emergency Scout's First Aid to campers and leaders.

NOTE: Prescriptions or medications WILL ONLY be Administered between 7 am and 10 pm daily!

All medications are required to be checked in and kept in the health lodge. Parents should send the medications and instructions with their scout. The scout then visits the Health Lodge as needed to take their medication.

It is the scout's responsibility to see that they take their medications as prescribed.

Medical Forms and Special Accommodations

BSA requirements state that all campers, youth, and adults, bring with them a copy of the NEW completed medical form, (A, B, & C MUST BE COMPLETED), which is available on the Council's Website. This form must be completed annually and signed by a licensed

physician. Bring <u>ONLY A COPY</u> of your completed medical form. All special accommodations such as diet restrictions should be brought to the attention of the camp director at least 2 weeks before your scheduled arrival date.


In 2021 we added a Campership Program to help Scouts attend Eagle Camp to earn those Required Badges needed!

AVAILABILITY & REVIEW PROCEDURES

- Camperships shall be available for all RESIDENT CAMPS, Including EAGLE CAMP.
- Camperships will be considered on a first come, first served basis.
- All campership applications must be received no later than April 7th, 2025.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

- > Applications are available on council website. Unit leaders are responsible for completing the "unit information" section and distributing applications to families with a perceived need.
- > Parents or Guardians are responsible for the remainder of the application and for its submission.
- Incomplete applications will be denied.
