Camp Buck Run

Its name was changed to Buck Run in 1962 and was used for Junior Leader Training and primitive camping for nearly 20 years. With the introduction of the Tiger program in 1982, its focus is shifted to serving Cub Scouts which remains the case today.


August Order of the Arrow Brotherhood Calling Out August 2023

Summer Camp Programs

The Westmoreland-Fayette Council leases two long term camping facilities and owns one short term camping property.

Camp Conestoga is one facility located within Eberly Scout Reservation and is the home of the council's Scouts BSA Resident Camp which operated five sessions of Resident Camp and was available for individual unit camping between September & November.


Camp Buck Run is the second facility located within Eberly Scout Reservation and it is the home of the council's Cub Scout Resident camp which operated five sessions during the summer of 2023 and was available for individual unit camping and council operated training.

Camp Tenacharison is located in Smithton, Pennsylvania and serves as the council's short term camping property for unit rental and council/district training and events.

Camp Attendance History







A \$1,000 grant provided by the Lancaster Archery Foundation provided new archery targets for Cub Resident Camp at Buck Run

In 2023, the Katherine Mabis Mckenna Foundation provided a \$13,000 grant to support improving camping accommodations. This included the addition of five new canvas tents into circulation, the installation of 60 tent outrigger supports, and the replacement of mattresses at Camp Buck Run.








